#### 2. Updates/Announcements

# c. Status of Pennsylvania Electronic Student Transcripts and Records System (PA eSTARS)

PDE received limited grant funding to continue the PA eSTARS initiative through December 31, 2013. PA eSTARS is a voluntary initiative. Colleges signing with Parchment by December 31 are eligible to receive special rates and have the \$3,000 onboarding fee covered by PDE. Nearly 450 high schools and 100 postsecondary institutions in PA use Parchment to send and/or receive transcripts electronically. Currently, ten of the 14 Community Colleges, seven of the 14 PASSHE universities, and all four State-Related institutions participate. Nearly all TAOC institutions subscribe to Parchment's free eTranscript receiver platform.

#### 3. TAOC/PA TRAC Maintenance Activities

#### a. Composite PA TRAC Status Report (See Appendix B)

PA TRAC averages approximately 35,000-40,000 hits per year; 67% of site traffic is from first-time visitors.

#### b. Transfer Profile Update - Due by August 31

TAOC requires colleges to update their Transfer Profile on PA TRAC annually by August 31. PDE sent a reminder to institutional contacts at the beginning of August. Since adding the "Will My Credits Transfer?" feature to the Profile pages in May 2013, students have created over 70% more accounts than over the three corresponding months in 2012. The profiles are the second most popular destination on PA TRAC.



Transfer Profiles are a key marketing tool for colleges and should be reviewed carefully to ensure information is accurate. Colleges are again encouraged to add a veteran's contact to their respective Profile pages. CCP was the first to update their Profile.

#### c. Degree Program Upload – Due by August 31

TAOC requires colleges to upload degree program information annually by August 31. PDE sent a reminder to institutional contacts at the beginning of August. PASSHE's Office of the Chancellor (Eric Zeglen) regularly provides this information to AcademyOne for all PASSHE universities. All other institutions are responsible for uploading degree programs directly to the system.

The Program Search includes nearly 5,000 degree programs. The Degree Program upload provides the information needed for the Program Search on PA TRAC and the Statewide P2P Database.

#### d. Course Catalog Extracts - Due by September 20

TAOC requires colleges to have current course information on PA TRAC and to submit a current Course Catalog Extract annually. Colleges have until September 20, 2013, to submit the extract to AcademyOne. The week of August 19, AcademyOne will email institutional contacts with submission instructions and a list of tips and hints.

Primary TAOC members are responsible for ensuring the extract is submitted by the deadline and working with their staff to ensure the information being submitted is accurate. Please alert AcademyOne to any major changes such as new course prefixes (i.e. ENG to ENGL, SPE to COM).

#### e. Transfer Event Calendar

Anyone with a PA TRAC user account may add events to the Transfer Event Calendar on PA TRAC at no charge and at any time. TAOC members can contact AcademyOne or Julie Kane (PDE), if they need more information.

#### f. Course Equivalency Management Center (CEMC)

TAOC colleges have identified more than 659,000 transfer course equivalencies in CEMC as of August 14, 2013. These equivalencies are accessible through the Search for Equivalencies feature on PA TRAC, the most popular section of the site.

#### g. PA TRAC Redesign

PDE is working with AcademyOne to redesign PA TRAC so that it's easier to navigate, has a more current "look", and can be viewed on Android or iPhone devises. They also are reviewing each page of the site for accuracy and revising content accordingly. The goal is to release the new site around mid-October.

PDE has been reaching out to TAOC members for assistance and also will be "testing" the site with students and advisors. TAOC members will have an opportunity to review the site and provide feedback before the re-launch.

The new site will include a page containing information and resources for veterans and service members. The PDE Division of Veterans and Military Education will assist with content. There was request to add this as a discussion item on the October TAOC meeting agenda.

Julie asked TAOC reps. to email her with transfer statistics and quotes/testimonials from students, advisors, etc., that PDE could post on PA TRAC. Quotes currently being used are out of date.



# 4. DISCUSSION ITEM: Assessment Subcommittee's recommended plan for the annual assessment/evaluation of the statewide transfer system (See <u>Recommended TAOC</u> <u>Evaluation Plan v2.1</u>)

On behalf of Transfer Subcommittee Chair Tom Gregory (Penn College), Joe Santivasci (West Chester) and Julie reviewed the subcommittee's recommended plan for the annual assessment/evaluation of the statewide transfer system.

Joe and Julie provided the following points of clarification:

- Community colleges already submit data in PIMS. The proposed plan requires no change to this process for AY13-14.
- PASSHE universities would submit data to the Office of the Chancellor (OOC), which would then upload the required transfer data to PIMS. The OOC confirmed the universities already submit the transfer data elements being submitted by community colleges. PASSHE universities should not have to collect new data elements or change their SIS in order to submit transfer data for AY13-14.
- Opt-ins will submit data directly to PIMS. PDE will provide technical assistance as needed.
- The proposed workflow/timeline aligns with the current collection schedule for community colleges.
- Current practice has PDE providing community colleges with a PIMS user manual in August that details all of the data elements being collected for the upcoming academic year.
- After the plan is approved, the subcommittee will recommend indicators and data elements for AY14-15. That should give colleges nearly a year to prepare for the collection.
- The expectation is that data will be submitted at the unit-level but reported in the aggregate. During Year 1, TAOC will decide how data is extracted from PIMS and how it is analyzed.
- TAOC is responsible for preparing an annual report to the General Assembly and will need to decide how data is presented.
- Benchmarks for participating institutions and the transfer system as a whole are not identified in legislation. TAOC could establish benchmarks through policy, but that has not been discussed and is not part of the proposed plan.

The following feedback relates to the proposed Assessment Plan Goals:

- The footnote in Goal #1 is confusing.
- Goals #4 and #5 are not articulated in legislation and appear to be more appropriate as "success indicators" rather than "system goals". TAOC members suggested either eliminating the two goals or combining them in a way that clearly ties to the legislation.

Joe and Julie will share TAOC's comments with the subcommittee and see what, if any, changes the subcommittee would like to make before presenting a final recommendation for TAOC vote. TAOC members will have one week to review and vote to approve or reject the plan. Approval requires two-third vote by voting TAOC members.

Below is a tentative timeline for voting on the plan:

- August 19 PDE will email TAOC reps with subcommittee's final recommendation
- August 19-23 TAOC reps vote electronically to approve or reject recommendation
- August 26 PDE emails voting results to TAOC and posts plan on PA TRAC, if approved

#### 5. 30-Credit Transfer Framework

- a. Status of Subcommittee Evaluations
- b. Timeline for approving new Framework Titles and recommending courses for new titles

The Framework subcommittees have been unable to complete the pending course evaluations due to some members being unavailable during the summer. This work will resume once the fall term starts.



Below is the target timeline for completing pending reviews, proposing new Framework titles, and reviewing new Framework courses:

- September 2013: Subcommittees complete pending course evaluations <u>and</u> recommend new Framework course titles
- October 2013: TAOC reviews and votes on new Framework titles
- November 2013-January 2014: Colleges propose courses for new and existing Framework titles
- January-March 2014: Subcommittees review all courses proposed by colleges

#### 6. Statewide Program-to-Program (P2P) Articulation

#### a. Statewide P2P Articulation Database

As of August 14, 2013, 32 TAOC institutions have identified 601 articulated degree programs in 25 programs of study as part of statewide P2P articulation. Institutions may update the P2P Database any time.

May 15, 2014 is the deadline to identify articulated degrees for P2P agreements effective Fall 2014 (e.g., Political Science).

b. ACTION ITEM: Proposal from the Ad Hoc TAOC Subcommittee Formed to Review P2P Agreements that Include 30-Credit Framework Requirements (See Appendix C) Catherine McElroy (Bucks) reviewed the subcommittee's proposal with the group. The proposal passed without objection or discussion. The subcommittee will provide a status report and any additional recommendations at the October TAOC meeting.

#### c. Student Verification

PDE is waiting until after the fall term begins to reconvene the ad hoc subcommittee. An update will be provided in October.

#### d. Institutional Verification

Use the <u>Search for Statewide Program-to-Program Agreements</u> to find out which associate degrees lead to which bachelor degrees. Contact PDE or AcademyOne for a list in Excel.

Mary Frances Archey (CCAC) asked if 4-year colleges were expected to modify their curricula so that the first 60 credits of the bachelor degree include the foundation level content and competencies identified in the P2P agreements. Assessment will be difficult if transfer students and native students have different backgrounds when they reach junior standing.

Some 4-yr TAOC representatives thought they only needed to modify curriculum if the current bachelor degree program didn't allow for the acceptance of the articulated associate degree. They didn't think they had to make sure the first 60 credits of the degree program included the content and competencies outlined in a P2P agreement. Ginny Mihalik (Lehigh-Carbon CC) said transfer students will be held to a different standard unless the 4-yrs adopt the same requirements.

Legislation (24 P.S. § 20-2002-C) requires participating institutions to identify AA and AS degrees that align with the graduation requirements of parallel baccalaureate degrees. Section 8 of TAOC's *General Statewide Program-to-Program Articulation Agreement in Pennsylvania (Revised April 11, 2012)* says "the Bachelor Degree Institution will recognize all competencies attained within the AA or AS degree and accept a transfer student who has earned the associate degree with full junior standing into a parallel baccalaureate degree program."



Julie said TAOC charged the PACs with identifying the foundation-level content and competencies required for a student to transfer with junior standing into a parallel bachelor degree and be prepared for advanced coursework in that program. Two- and 4-year faculty members participate on PACs. Therefore, it is expected that approved P2P agreements agreement represent a shared set of foundation-level content and competencies recognized by both 2- and 4-yr institutions.

Jim Moran (PASSHE OOC) said national initiatives such as the Degree Qualifications Profile and Tuning Process aim to identify what students should know and be able to do (learning outcomes) in order to earn degrees at various levels. Essentially TAOC has done the same thing through the P2P agreements – we have identified learning outcomes for students entering a program of study as a junior. He said 4-year institutions need to recognize this statewide effort and the agreement requirements.

Institutions identify P2P degree programs in the Statewide P2P Articulation Database. Kathleen Howley (PASSHE OOC) asked what is the P2P "Accuracy Verification Statement" (AVS) says and wondered if it should be amended to outline expectations more clearly.

#### e. Political Science - Effective Fall 2014

Institutions have until May 15, 2014, to identify associate and bachelor degrees that meet the requirements of the approved statewide P2P agreement in Political Science.

#### f. Music

Once the fall term begins, PDE will contact the PAC co-chairs regarding the status of the agreement. PDE will notify TAOC members when a draft agreement is ready for review and vote.

#### g. 4-8 Education

Once the fall term begins, PDE will contact the PAC co-chairs regarding the status of the agreement. PDE will notify TAOC members when a draft agreement is ready for review and vote.

#### h. Secondary Education

Once the fall term begins, PDE will contact the PAC co-chairs regarding the status of the agreement. PDE will notify TAOC members when a draft agreement is ready for review and vote.

# Appendix B: Composite PA TRAC Status Report for Participating Institutions as of August 13, 2013

#### Notes:

- 1. **Program Search** allows students to search for institutions by program of study. Degree program information is uploaded by each institution at least once year; PASSHE's Office of the Chancellor provides degree program information for the PASSHE universities.
- 2. Course Search allows students to search for institutions based upon specific course criteria. The database is populated by course data provided by each institution at least once a year.
- 3. Course Equivalency Search allows students to find out how specific courses taken at one college transfer to another college.
- 4. Transfer Agreements are articulation agreements that allow students to transfer in or out of a university.
- 5. **College Profile** is where a college provides institution-specific information to transfer students. *Profile Views* represents the cumulative total times a college's transfer profile has been viewed since January 16, 2009. *Request Info Views* represents the cumulative total times the "Request Information" page has been viewed since January 16, 2009. *Requests for More Information* are submitted electronically to the point of contact responsible for maintaining the institution's profile.

# Appendix C: Proposal from the Ad Hoc Subcommittee Formed to Review P2P Agreements that Include 30-Credit Framework Requirements

#### Background

TAOC at one point had instructed PACs to include the Framework in their agreements. TAOC later reconsidered this decision since the Framework is based on course equivalency standards rather than on competencies. PACs were informed of the change and reminded that the intent of the agreements is to identify major-specific competencies and content required for a student to transfer as a junior into advance coursework. PACs responded in various ways. Some PACs may have been under the impression they were required to include the Framework in the agreement. Some made the conscious decision to include the Framework even though such inclusion was not mandated.

At the May 23, 2013 meeting, TAOC charged an ad hoc subcommittee with reviewing proposed amendments to P2P agreements that include Framework requirements, determining the reason for including such requirements, and recommending to TAOC how to proceed. The group was asked to present its recommendations at the August 15 TAOC meeting.

#### Proposal

- For each agreement that includes the Framework in its entirety, Subcommittee members will return to the TAOC member (or another member) of the PAC and ask, given the revised understanding that it is not necessary to include the entire Framework, if the PAC wishes to retain the entire Framework or if it wishes to revisit the agreement.
- For those PACs that wish to retain the entire Framework and keep the agreement as it stands, no further action is necessary.
- For those PACs that included the entire Framework because the PAC thought it was a requirement, the PAC member will decide how to proceed further with his/her PAC. The Subcommittee will provide suggestions to each PAC.
